

## SEVEN TOP DRIVERS OF CHANGE FOR ATLANTA METRO AREA COUNTIES OF SOUTH FULTON, CLAYTON, FAYETTE, AND COWETA BETWEEN 2024 AND 2050

#### Fairburn Foresight Workgroup Draft Report 2x2 Matrix Scenarios

In an ever-evolving world where the intersection of faith, society, and individual well-being is increasingly complex, the need for forward-thinking and adaptive leadership within local churches has never been more critical. This report presents the results of a comprehensive strategic foresight brainstorming analysis conducted for the Fairburn Baptist Association (FBA), encompassing 36 churches across Fayette, South Fulton, and Coweta Counties in Georgia. The focus of this study is to explore potential future scenarios based on two pivotal drivers: the <u>nature of leadership</u> (active vs. passive) and the <u>engagement with spiritual, emotional, and mental wellness</u> within the church and community.

The FBA, in its mission to remain a relevant and effective spiritual force, recognizes the importance of addressing these drivers head-on. As such, this report delineates four distinct scenarios—*Typical Type, Dying Church, The Model, and Poser Church*—each offering a unique perspective on how varying leadership and wellness approaches can shape our churches' future and their impact on congregations and communities. These scenarios are not predictions but explorations of possible futures that can assist the FBA in strategic planning and decision-making.

The Fairburn Baptist Association (FBA) 's strategic foresight workgroup comprised 17 committed leaders, each a dedicated believer in Christ and His mission. This diverse group united in their biblical fidelity, represented various professional fields, including mental health, government, law enforcement, chaplaincy, education, business, local churches, and faith-based nonprofits. Their collective expertise facilitated a comprehensive and collaborative approach to strategic thinking, focusing on aligning the FBA's mission with the evolving community needs, particularly in leadership styles and spiritual, emotional, and mental wellness. This diverse assembly of 17 leaders will play a crucial role in developing forward-looking strategies and navigating the complex landscape facing the FBA.

The insights presented here are intended to guide the FBA and its affiliated churches toward a future where they can thrive spiritually, emotionally, and mentally, responding effectively to the challenges and opportunities. By examining these scenarios, the FBA can better prepare for the future, ensuring it continues serving its congregations and communities with compassion, relevance, and resilience.

#### 1. Typical Type (Active Leader/Unaware of Spiritual, Emotional, and Mental Wellness)

The "Typical Type" scenario describes a church leadership actively involved in event-driven and traditional denominational activities but remains largely unaware of the importance of spiritual, emotional, and mental wellness. This approach often relies on old paradigms, making the church visibly engaged yet possibly unspiritual and carnal in the eyes of some congregants. The leadership often tends to be political and may inadvertently polarize the

congregation, leading to burnout and fatigue due to a lack of holistic wellness integration in their spiritual practices and community engagement.

By 2050, churches in this category may find themselves in a challenging position. While they are active in leadership and traditional practices, their lack of engagement with spiritual, emotional, and mental wellness could lead to a disconnect with congregational needs. These churches might be seen as out of touch with the growing recognition of wellness in the surrounding communities. They could face difficulties attracting and retaining younger generations seeking a more integrated approach to faith and wellness. This scenario might result in stagnating or declining congregations, with leadership needing help to adapt to the evolving expectations of a more wellness-aware society.

### 2. Dying Church (Passive Leader/Unaware of Spiritual, Emotional, and Mental Wellness)

In the "Dying Church" scenario, leadership is characterized by passivity and a lack of awareness of spiritual, emotional, and mental wellness needs. This leads to a concerning absence of a leadership pipeline and a significant disengagement of younger people. The church's focus tends to be on mere survival, with pastors potentially becoming isolated, focusing on their agendas rather than the broader needs of the congregation. The denial of wellness issues exacerbates problems like depression and fatigue, both in leadership and within the congregation, leading to an overall decline in church vitality and relevance.

Churches with passive leadership and unawareness of wellness issues could significantly decline by 2050. This scenario might lead to increasing irrelevance in their communities, as they need to address the evolving wellness needs of their members and the people they seek to attract. The lack of proactive engagement and wellness integration could result in dwindling congregations, especially among the youth. These churches may struggle to maintain their presence. They could face closures, mergers, or a shift towards more informal forms of worship and community as traditional structures fail to meet the needs of their communities.

#### 3. The Model (Active Leader/Aware of Spiritual, Emotional, and Mental Wellness)

"The Model" represents an ideal scenario where church leadership is active and deeply engaged with spiritual, emotional, and mental wellness. These leaders are kingdom-minded, prioritizing the holistic well-being of their congregation. They actively mentor and develop a pipeline of new leaders and are committed to church planting and community engagement. This leadership style fosters a church environment that is a resource and support to the association, modeling a balanced approach to spiritual and wellness needs, which resonates strongly within the community.

In this scenario, active and wellness-aware leaders will likely flourish in churches. By 2050, these churches could be at the forefront of integrating spiritual, emotional, and mental wellness into their ministries, appealing to a broad demographic. They might become influential

community centers, offering support and guidance that aligns with evangelical values while addressing holistic wellness needs. These churches could lead in innovative ministry approaches, adapting to technological and societal changes and potentially influencing broader religious and wellness conversations. Their focus on leadership development and church planting may result in a strong network of like-minded churches, significantly impacting their communities and beyond.

#### 4. Poser Church (Passive Leader/Aware of Spiritual, Emotional, and Mental Wellness)

The "Poser Church" scenario describes a church where the leadership, while aware of the importance of spiritual, emotional, and mental wellness, remains passive and disengaged from actively integrating these aspects into the church's ministry. This approach often leads to outsourcing ministry responsibilities and a lack of intentional giving, which can compromise the church's authenticity and effectiveness. The leadership in this scenario tends to be more of a joiner than a true leader, often needing more creativity and originality. They may talk about wellness issues in sermons but fail to take concrete action, expecting others to lead initiatives like church planting. This resistance to actively engaging in community issues, particularly in their immediate surroundings, and a general inactivity despite awareness creates a gap between the church's professed values and its practical impact.

Despite being aware of wellness issues, churches in this scenario may struggle to integrate these into their ministries due to passive leadership. By 2050, they might be perceived as needing more authenticity in their approach to wellness, potentially leading to stagnation in growth and influence. These churches could maintain a stable congregation but may fail to engage with their community's evolving wellness needs deeply. They might risk being overshadowed by more proactive and genuinely integrated churches, leading to challenges in maintaining relevance and impact in their communities.

# Ten potential drivers of change that could significantly impact evangelical churches in the south Atlanta metro, South Fulton County, Fayette County, and Coweta County, Georgia, between 2024 and 2050

#### Demographic shifts:

- 1. Increasing diversity: The region's demographics are projected to become more diverse, with growing Hispanic, Asian, and non-Christian populations. Evangelical churches will need to adapt to reach these new communities or risk declining membership.
- 2. Generational changes: Younger generations tend to be less religiously affiliated and hold different values than older generations. Evangelical churches will need to find ways to attract and retain younger members without alienating older ones.
